Long Eared Owl and I live at the Suffolk

Owl Sanctuary with lots of owl friends

and other birds of prey. Here are some

interesting facts about me:

Long Eared Owls nest in the old stick nests of magpies, crows and sparrowhawks and in old squirrel drays. Comfy!

We are usually solitary birds, but in winter we owls are known to roost in large groups called Parliaments.

In China "eared" owls like me are know as "cat eared hawks"

Long ago, only noblemen were allowed to wear plumes of feathers, so in France the Long Eared Owl, with feathers in his 'hat' was known as the Owl Duke!

Young Long Eared owls are very noisy when calling for food! They sound like when calling for feeling opened. OUCH!

The feathered tufts on my head are not used for hearing, but are raised when I am wary and laid flat when I am relaxed.

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Many of Maz's potients have been

Many of Maz's patients have been injured in road traffic accidents after colliding with vans & cars.

Some are badly bruised - others have injuries to eyes or wings.

MEDIC MAZ

Maz Robinson is the falconer in charge of the Raptor Hospital at the Suffolk Owl Sanctuary where injured wild owls and other birds of prey are treated.



When birds are admitted to the hospital, Maz assesses their injuries, their weight and general condition.



To fatten up a poorly bird, Maz will feed it small morsels of food frequently. As it gains strength it will start to feed on its own again.



If the bird has an infection or needs a bone x-rayed, Maz will take it to our vet, Paul, who has specialist knowledge of owls and other birds of prey.

Some birds are very thin when they come in - perhaps bad weather means food is scarce or an injury or infection has prevented the bird from hunting.

Once our patients have recovered and gained weight, they are released back to the area where they were found.

Sick birds are kept in special rehabilitation aviaries
- which are quiet and secluded - whilst they recover.
They usually stay for about 3 weeks.
